What is the purpose of legal research?

The purpose of legal research is to help you prepare a written statement that will provide the court with the facts and legal issues necessary to make its decision. The facts are what happened. Legal issues are principles of law as defined in cases and laws that support your request for the judge to rule in your favor. Court rules and laws state the requirements for filing papers and following procedures.

The legal research services, Westlaw, LexisAdvance, and E-books, help you find laws and cases that define legal issues. Since legal research requires coordinating common legal principles and the facts that happened to you, organizing your research is essential.

Starting legal research also means learning a new vocabulary: presuit investigation, theory of the case, settlement negotiations, etc. The quote below from *New York Civil Practice Before Trial* uses unfamiliar words, but you must learn what these terms mean to successfully research and prepare legal papers:

§ 2:201 Issues to Research

Your legal memo should address:

Applicable causes of action or defenses

- The elements of each cause of action or defense
- The applicable statute of limitations and if applicable, available tolling theories
- Defenses or causes of action available to the opposition and their essential elements

- The applicable burden of proof for each cause of action or defense
- Any special evidentiary requirements or problems
- Applicable legal trends
- Previous rulings by the assigned judge
